PROCESSIONS WITH THE PILGRIM STATUE OF OUR LADY

A parish is not limited in what para-liturgical activities it might undertake with the pilgrim statue of Our Lady. However, it would probably be best to make use of some aspects of the tradition in designing such para-liturgical celebrations. When it comes to processions, a parish could adopt certain elements from what were known as Rogation Days in the past. The word 'rogation' comes from the Latin word 'rogate' which means to ask, petition or beg. In the past, Rogation Days were set aside as special times of penance, prayer, procession, and Mass, especially after calamitous events. These can be traced at least as far back as the fifth century. The typical time for Rogation Days were on April 25th or on the Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday before Ascension. However, Rogation Days can take place anytime except Sundays, Solemnities, All Souls' Day, Ash Wednesday and Holy Week.

Historically in the Midwest, Rogation Days typically had a strong agricultural tone. Rural parishes would incorporate the blessing of fields. There would also be prayers for a bountiful harvest, protection from storms, and timely rains. In more urban settings, the blessings of industry and commerce were incorporated. Rogation Days are a summons to personal conversion and to trusting confidence in God's mercy and goodness.

A rural parish might want to schedule a procession with the pilgrim statue of Our Lady sometime in the Spring to ask for a bountiful harvest, before the parish's patronal feast day celebration, or before Marian feast day. This could also be a eucharistic procession of one would desire to do so. Said procession could go around the church grounds or, as was typically done in the past, the procession could be the length of a few miles as one walks to the limits of the parish boundaries. Along the way there would typically be four stations/altars where there would be ornate crosses set up and prayers and or reflections could be given.

Typically, one would sing Psalms that have to do with the idea of penance and/or for the blessing of a bountiful harvest. Children would walk carrying green boughs of trees typical to the area, especially those that might be harvested, and girls would carry bundles of native flowers.

Especially important would be the singing of the Litany of Saints and the Canticle from Daniel 3:37-88, 56 (Bless the Lord, all you works of the Lord). A sample celebration of a Rogation Day procession from the Diocese of Fargo is provided.

AT THE PROCESSION

(All gather in the church to pray. At a certain certain point the priest stands and the cantor/reader begins the antiphon. All stand)




